But those were open to


students from all schools served by MATC.

"He that tilleth his land shall have plenty of bread: but he that followeth after vain persons shall have poverty enough."

The verse is Proverbs 28:19. Chat with the Rev. Nate McConathy, the new pastor at Union Hill Baptist Church west of Purcell, and it is quickly apparent why he tells a visitor it is his favorite Scripture.

And if McConathy sounds familiar, it's likely because Nate's father, the Rev. Barry McConathy, preached from the Union Hill pulpit more than 21 years before stepping down at the end of 2020.

That's right. Nate is a preacher's kid who felt called to the ministry when he was 16 or 17.

Originally from Houston, Nate graduated in 2005 from Oklahoma Baptist University with a degree in youth ministry and a minor in sociology. Four years later he graduated from Rockbridge Seminary in Springfield, Mo.

He and his wife, Whitney, have been married 16 years and have two children.

Mollie, 8, will start third grade this fall at Washington and Reed, 4, is headed for pre-kindergarten there.

For five years Nate was one of three youth pastors at First Baptist Church in Rogers, Ark.

He's spent the last 11 years as youth pastor at First Baptist Church in Yukon.

Union Hill is his first assignment as pastor.

Despite the family connection to the rural church, Nate said his father never mentioned that he might apply.

He's not one to pull strings, Nate said of his father, and "didn't want the church to think he was trying to manipulate the situation."

Clear skies and hot temps

A high-pressure dominant system continues to sit overhead and create a "heat dome" of sorts that will continue to bring seasonal temperatures and clear skies for the next several days here in Oklahoma. Sunny skies will persist into this weekend, with temperatures hanging in the mid-to-low 90s through Saturday. Sunday a small bit of cloud cover begins to build as the passage of a very weak cold front begins to happen, and that will bring some small and scattered rain chances on Monday. The cold front won't do much good in terms of temperature, as we are still hanging in the nineties all across Oklahoma through the next seven days. The moisture will also continue to linger, keeping our Heat Index values 5-10 degrees warmer than our actual air temperatures, so remember to find shade, stay hydrated, and don't spend extended periods of time outside.

Business picking up in state

The June 2021 distribution of sales tax collections by the Oklahoma Tax Commission totaled \$183,157,926 to municipalities. That is an increase of \$40,826,490 from the \$12,331,436 a year ago. The use tax disbursement to cities and towns was \$24,521,257. Oklahoma's counties shared a \$30,856,699 sales tax disbursement and \$5,405,288 use tax disbursement. Disbursements were based on sales from April 16-30 and estimated sales from May 1-15.

Horses need up-to-date West Nile virus vaccinations

Horses account for about 97 percent of reported non-human mammalian cases of West Nile virus encephalitis, according to the American Association of Equine Practitioners, underscoring the need for horse owners to employ sound animal-health-management strategies.

West Nile virus can cause encephalitis, which is inflammation of the brain. The virus can also cause meningitis, an inflammation of the lining in the brain and spinal cord, in people and horses.

The virus has been identified throughout most of North America, from Canada into Mexico.

"Adult horses that have been vaccinated previously should be revaccinated annually in the spring," said Kris Hiney, Oklahoma State University Extension equine specialist. "Horses that have never been vaccinated or that have an unknown vaccination history will likely need a series of vaccinations. Vaccines need to be given prior to a horse catching the disease."

OSU Extension recommendations are for horse owners

and equine managers to consult with their local large animal veterinarian as there are different vaccines available on the market.

The preferred strategy for mares is to vaccinate before they become pregnant. Limited studies have been performed that examine vaccinal protection against West Nile in pregnant mares, with only one of the currently licensed West Nile vaccines being labeled as safe to use.

"Again, consult with your local veterinarian," Hiney said. "Common recommendations are to initiate a primary vaccination series immediately in pregnant mares that have never been vaccinated. Foals born from unvaccinated mares typically begin a vaccination series at around three months of age, while those born from vaccinated mares typically begin getting their series of shots at about four months of age."

Young horses and older horses are most at risk for contracting the West Nile virus, she said. Hiney recently provided additional insights about West Nile virus in horses on the agricultural television show "SUNUP."

Nile:

The most common signs of West Nile virus infection in horses may include:

- Lack of coordination, even leading to stumbling
- Weakness in the animal's limbs
- Partial paralysis
- Muscular twitching
- Even death, in some cases

"As a number of highly contagious and non-contagious diseases can present with neurologic symptoms, always consult a veterinarian immediately if your horse shows neurologic symptoms," Hiney said.

Studies and anecdotal evidence suggest fever only occurs in a quarter of cases. A horse will exhibit signs within 15 days of being bitten. West Nile virus infections are most common from May to October.

The virus is transmitted by many different mosquito species – which vary geographically. Predictions as to the severity of a viral outbreak is difficult to predict given the regional variations.

"Treatment is important for any horse with West Nile virus," Hiney said. "The ef-

fect the virus has on a specific horse will determine if home or clinical care is warranted. All treatment protocols should be conducted under the direction of a veterinarian."

Recovery times depend on the health and age of an infected horse. Data indicates about two out of three horses infected with West Nile virus will survive but may suffer long-term effects.

Tips for a safe mosquito season

Mosquito season has arrived, and the Oklahoma State Department of Health is offering tips to help avoid ailments spread by the insects. West Nile Virus is the most common disease spread by mosquitoes in Oklahoma.

"As much rain as we are having, mosquitoes are going to be abundant this season," Public Health Veterinarian LeMac Morris said. "Weather has a major influence on mosquito populations. May is the traditional start of mosquito season, but mosquitoes can appear as early as March and may persist even after the first fall frost."

According to the CDC, there are no vaccines to prevent or medications to treat West Nile Virus in people. Fortunately, most people infected with WNV do not feel sick.

About one in five people who are infected develop a fever and other symptoms. About one out of 150 infected people develop a serious, sometimes fatal, illness.

Mosquitoes can bite day or night. They hibernate in or near homes to survive cold temperatures, and lay their eggs

anywhere with stagnant water. Mosquitoes can lay eggs in as little as a tablespoon of standing water.

Preventing mosquito bites and controlling mosquitoes around your home are the best ways to protect against mosquito-borne diseases.

Prevent mosquito bites with 'The Four D's':

DEET — Apply mosquito repellent containing DEET or another approved active ingredient.

• EPA-registered insect repellents include: DEET, Picaridin, OLE and IR3535.

• Always follow label instructions when applying insect repellents.

• Do not apply insect repel-

lent to your hands, eyes, mouth, cuts, or irritated skin.

• Reapply as directed on the product label.

Dusk (and Dawn)—Avoid being outdoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.

Drain—Drain any standing, stagnant water found in containers or areas around your home and workplace.

Dress—Dress yourself in long sleeves and long pants to shield skin from mosquitoes.

Control mosquitoes around your home:

• Keep windows and door screens in good repair.

Strategize your money flow

If your outgo is more than your income then your upkeep will be your downfall.

Asure way to disable yourself financially is to spend more than your income.

If your income is \$2,500 a month then you can't spend \$3,500 a month and come out ahead.

An old friend used to say, "You can't borrow yourself rich."

We have "wants" and "needs." Needs must always outweigh wants. We need food and shelter, transportation and basic utilities to survive.

A person with a small income has severe financial pressure and must live on a strict budget. The person who has a lot

of income still must determine a budget. The principal is the same for the person who has more income.

Your outgo must not exceed your income. If you are earning \$9,000 a month but spending \$10,000 you are going to end up in financial trouble.

With a very low income even the very basic needs become a luxury. Keeping the house warm or cool is a luxury. Buying good or healthy groceries are difficult. Buying gasoline to go to work is expensive.

If you have access to a credit card, the pressure is great to put basic living needs on the card but the exorbitant fees and interest of credit card companies begin to quickly intensify your financial burden.

Your choices are few when it comes to good household budgeting. Let's look at a lean budget.

Let's say your income is \$2,000 a month. You can afford the following: \$500 a month in rent, \$250 a month in utilities, \$250 a month for a used car payment and \$150 a month for gasoline. This gives you \$850 a month to buy food on and buy basic auto insurance.

You will have to go through your state medical insurance program and apply for free state health insurance because you can't afford to buy health insurance.

You also have to figure out

Bringing awareness to Alzheimer's

During Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month, we remember that many families have felt the heartbreaking impact of Alzheimer's disease in some way.

Sadly, more than six million Americans are currently suffering with the disease. Throughout this month, we recognize this national health crisis and draw attention to efforts to slow down, prevent and ultimately find cures for Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia.

Like many across the country, my family knows all too well the heartbreaking decline that takes place in those suffering with this disease.

During the last several years of my father's life, my family watched helplessly as he became a different person and slowly lost a lifetime of memories throughout the various stages of Alzheimer's.

Unfortunately, the Alzheimer's Association recently reported that Alzheimer's and dementia-related deaths increased 16 percent during the coronavirus pandemic. Even before this rapid increase, this national health crisis carried enormous financial and human costs, straining both public and private budgets.

In fact, it is credited as the

most expensive disease in the United States. By 2050, Alzheimer's is projected to cost our country more than \$1.1 trillion, even before inflation. That is more than three times the government spending under Medicare and Medicaid and in out-of-pocket spending.

However, I am encouraged that steps have been taken to provide some hope and find answers. As the top Republican leader on the appropriations subcommittee responsible for health spending, I have always been a staunch supporter and advocate for increasing funding for dedicated Alzheimer's disease research at the National Institutes of Health.

When I chaired the panel, I was proud to shepherd and help secure historic funding increases for this worthy cause – quadrupling federal support from \$600 million a year to \$3.1 billion this year.

Thanks to Congress prioritizing and delivering more funding for biomedical research, there have been promising developments in the fight against Alzheimer's in recent months and years.

Just this month, the Food and Drug Administration approved a new drug created to slow cognitive decline in those suffering with the disease – this is the first new drug to treat

Alzheimer's since 2003.

Because of these advancements and others to come, we must keep up the momentum. Indeed, for my part, I remain dedicated to working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to build on and further boost research funding that could lead to lifesaving clues, answers and treatments.

This Congress, I am proud to cosponsor the Alzheimer's Caregiver Support Act, which authorizes grants to public and non-profit organizations to expand training and support services for families and unpaid caregivers of patients with Alzheimer's or other forms of dementia.

I am also a cosponsor of the Comprehensive Care for Alzheimer's Act, which would pilot a new dementia care management model that would provide comprehensive care management services to Medicare beneficiaries with Alzheimer's.

Unfortunately, there are still a lot of unknowns about the cause of Alzheimer's as well as why and how it progresses. In the quest for answers and treatments, we must continue to prioritize funding as well as advocate for the quality of life for patients.

If we can find answers and solutions for Alzheimer's, the entire nation will be better off.

Update from the Capitol

With nearly 600 bills being signed into law, many major policy issues were addressed this session.

As a healthcare professional, I was extremely pleased with the investments and policies made to improve the health of all Oklahomans, including better access to healthcare, especially in rural areas like ours.

The budget includes \$164 million to cover the first year of the voter-approved Medicaid expansion, which will provide critical healthcare services to an estimated 200,000 more citizens starting July 1.

Since applications opened at the beginning of the month, more than 51,000 people have been approved for benefits through SoonerCare. About 65 percent of those are women.

Under the expansion, adults ages 19 to 64 whose income is 138 percent or lower than the federal poverty level are eligible for coverage.

For an individual, this is around \$17,800 annually or nearly \$36,600 for a family of four. If you qualify, you may apply online at MySoonerCare.org or call 800-987-7767.

One of the reasons our state struggles with poor health outcomes is we simply don't have enough medical professionals, including nurses and doctors, to meet our healthcare needs.

To help increase our numbers and get more healthcare professionals on the job, we restored a historic sales tax credit for OU Health that will allow for a tremendous increase in the number of nurses and doctors trained in our state.

Nearly \$10 million was also appropriated to create a children's mental health unit to better address the mental health needs of our state's youth.

More than 70 health-related measures were signed into law, and I was proud to be the Senate author of many of these. My bills address a number of areas, including –

- authorizing pharmacists to substitute interchangeable biological products for prescribed biological products if the FDA has determined them interchangeable;
- directing the Department of Human Services (DHS) and the State Department of Health to enter into a data sharing agreement to assist with compliance of the federal Uniform Parent-

age Act;

- authorizing the Oklahoma's Children's Hospital to extend services to patients over the age of 21;

- modifying certain statutes pertaining to dentistry, including continuing education requirements, record keeping requirements, grounds for penalties and disciplinary actions;

- directing pharmacies that maintain drugs in an emergency medication kit to establish a policy and procedures governing the maintenance and dispensation of those drugs;

- making it illegal for someone who is the perpetrator of a substantiated finding by the Department of Human Services (DHS) of heinous and shocking abuse to work with children, reside in a childcare facility, or be hired by an employer who offers or provides services to children;

- providing that the safety plan monitor of a child in a safety plan with DHS may, if the child's parent is unavailable, authorize medical or dental treatment or examinations which are necessary for the child's well-being;

- limiting abortions in Oklahoma by requiring those performing such procedures to be board certified in obstetrics and gynecology;

- adding findings of child abuse or neglect that is heinous and shocking as legal grounds for the termination of parental rights as well as failing to protect a child from such treatment, even if it is not their own; and

- authorizing the DHS director and the executive director of the Office of Juvenile Affairs to enter into agreements on behalf of the state with Oklahoma Indian tribes regarding jurisdiction over child custody proceedings.

I'm excited about the results we'll see from all of the changes being made to improve the health of our citizens.

Next week, I'll discuss more of these innovative, but necessary changes. I look forward to hearing your thoughts on these and other bills approved this session.

Vacation plans should include landscape care

Many gardening enthusiasts work tirelessly to make sure they have an attractive landscape. After all those hours working outdoors, plant lovers deserve a little vacation time. But what can you do to help ensure the garden isn't dead when you return?

With a bit of preplanning, the landscape can look just as good when you get home as it did when you left, said Casey Hentges, Oklahoma State University Extension assistant specialist and host of the popular gardening program, Oklahoma Gardening.

"Outdoor gardening and landscape activities tend to ramp up in the summer, along with vacation plans. Pet owners who go away for several days at a time don't think twice about pet care, but sometimes people forget about having their landscape tended to while they're gone," Hentges said. "The easiest thing to do is to ask a trusted friend or neighbor to water, mow and weed while you're gone."

Hentges added, "If you've got a vegetable garden, entice the caretakers by letting them keep the fresh vegetables they pick while you're gone. There's no reason for any of that bounty to go to waste."

To help conserve water during the time you're away,

considering putting in three inches to four inches of mulch. Hentges said this is a good idea whether you're gone or not.

The mulch helps hold moisture around the plants and cuts down on the rate of evaporation, so when plants are irrigated, the water lasts longer. Mulch is a great addition to regular or raised beds and also helps dress them up.

Another option aside from mulch that will help plants hold water is water storing beads/crystals or hydrogel.

"The great thing about these types of products is they can

be used with both indoor and outdoor plants. The beads are incorporated into the flower bed or the soil of a flower pot," she said. "These polymers hold a tremendous amount of water in comparison to their size and the liquid is slowly released into the soil."

Don't think hydrogel is a long-term watering solution, however. Beads and crystals can keep flowerpots and beds moist for a couple of days, but they can't last the duration of

HealthCorps mission continues despite pandemic

HealthCorps CEO Amy Braun says while the pandemic forced her organization to alter its approach, its mission of improving health outcomes for students, their families and communities never skipped a beat.

"It's been a challenging year, but a really successful year," Braun said. "We shifted almost immediately to being digital (in March 2020) in providing resources to our students and schools as fast as we could. We definitely knew we needed to still be there for our kids."

HealthCorps is a national nonprofit organization currently operating in area public school systems in Davis, Purcell, Newcastle, Marietta and Kingston. The Chickasaw Nation sponsors HealthCorps coordinators at each of the five schools.

"We could not do it without Chickasaw Nation support," Braun said.

"We are honoring Governor Bill Anoatubby with a lifetime achievement award at the HealthCorps benefit this fall in New York City. Governor Anoatubby's commitment to health is unmatched. His recent dedication of three state-of-the-art facilities, a COVID-19 emergency operations facility, the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center Alternate Care site, and the expansion of the Chickasaw

Nation laboratory, are just a few of the proof points of the work he has accomplished.

"It's just an incredible achievement that really ties into everything HealthCorps so deeply believes. We wanted to honor him and recognize that work and the commitment to our kids and our communities," she said.

Oklahoma hasn't experienced quite as much virtual attendance as some other states, but Braun said there have been times when quick action became essential.

"In Oklahoma we've been able to be in person for most of this school year. But we've had times where there was an outbreak and the school needed to switch and we needed to switch quickly and seamlessly from in person to digital."

Braun says HealthCorps seeks to empower and educate teens by providing them with tools and resources to make lifelong health decisions and helping them become change agents within their communities.

HealthCorps employs a near-peer mentorship model that Braun says is invaluable when working with teens.

"Anyone who knows a teen knows they respond much better to their peers than to those in authority," she said. "We really feel that is the secret

sauce about the way we get our program across to our teens.

"We meet our teens where they are, helping them feel empowered to make changes in their schools and communities with a commitment to changing health. It's about giving them ownership and recognizing they have power to change their communities through all the tools at our disposal.

"It may involve a decision about working to provide a garden inside a school to get healthy meals and more access to fresh fruits and vegetables, or a decision about educating them on the importance of drinking water versus soda or some other sugary beverage."

One example of the program's positive impact involved a high school athlete who wasn't convinced HealthCorps had anything to offer her. But when track season rolled around she noticed her workouts went much better when she was drinking water rather than soft drinks.

"She found a real way to take a lesson from HealthCorps, implement it into her life and see the change," Braun said.

While HealthCorps' primary focus is students, schoolteachers and staff are also encouraged to participate in different

Safe:

- Prevent mosquitoes from laying eggs in or near water.
- Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or discard items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, bird baths, flower pots or trash containers.
- Use larvicides to treat large bodies of water not used for

drinking that can't be covered or dumped out. Larvicides prevent mosquito larvae from maturing into biting adults.

- Use an outdoor adulticide to kill adult mosquitoes in areas where they rest, such as dark, humid areas, under patio furniture or under the carport or garage.

- Mosquito control products are available at most home improvement and garden stores.

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

To highlight the enormity of this serious issue, the U.S. Postal Service is providing the public with information on the do's and don'ts of responsible dog ownership as part of its annual National Dog Bite Awareness Week public service campaign. The campaign runs through June 18.

This year's theme is "Be Aware: Any Dog Can Bite." Spread the news of the campaign by using the hashtag #dogbiteawareness. Dog bites are entirely preventable. One

bite is one too many.

"Raising awareness about dog bite prevention and how to protect our letter carriers as we deliver the mail is paramount," said USPS Acting Employee Safety and Health Awareness Manager Jamie Seavello. "Dogs are instinctive animals that may act to protect their turf and that why's it's important to inform the public about this campaign."

Dog owners are responsible for controlling their dogs. The best way to keep everyone safe from dog bites is to recognize and promote responsible pet ownership. Most people know the approximate time their letter carrier arrives every day and

having their dog secured as the carrier approaches their property for delivery will minimize any dog carrier interactions.

Pet owners should:

- Remind their children not to take mail directly from a letter carrier as the dog may view the carrier as a threat.

- When a letter carrier comes to the home, keep dogs inside the house or behind a fence, away from the door or in another room or on a leash.

Also, Informed Delivery is a great tool for customers. It's a free service that gives customers a digital preview of the mail and packages that are scheduled to be delivered so that they can take precautions and secure their dog when parcels are delivered to the door. Sign up at informedelivery.usps.com.

Letter carriers are trained to observe an area where they know dogs may be present. They are taught to be alert for potentially dangerous condi-

tions and to respect a dog's territory. Letter carriers know:

- Don't startle a dog.
- Keep your eyes on the dog.
- Never assume a dog won't bite.

- If entering a yard, make some noise or rattle a fence to alert the dog.

- Never attempt to pet or feed a dog.

- Place your foot against an outward swinging door.

If a dog attacks, carriers are also trained to stand their ground and protect their body by placing something between them and the dog, such as their mail satchel, and use dog repellent, if necessary.

Even though postal officials ask customers to control their dogs, unfortunately dog bites still happen, which may cause injuries to our carriers and costly medical expenses for dog owners. Please heed the above best practices to help stop dog bites and protect your letter carrier.

events throughout the year. Walktober, a yearly walking emphasis conducted in October encourages participation by students, teachers, administration and staff.

A program that started with Chickasaw Nation Nutrition Services has influenced other HealthCorps programs around the country.

"We expanded on the "Meal-time Blessings" program that originated in the Chickasaw Nation to include the schools we serve around the country. It's all about encouraging families to make the most of mealtimes by being together.

Studies show family mealtimes lower the risk of eating disorders, obesity, bulimia and substance abuse. Family mealtimes also increase academic success, high school graduation rates and college acceptance ratings."

Braun said HealthCorps relies heavily on statistical data. "We examine data in two different ways," she said. "First, we measure physical and mental health target behaviors. We used trade post surveys to understand how we are making changes in the community. I'm really proud to say in Oklahoma, 86 percent of our students who participate in our program show an improvement

in at least one of these targets."

She said the pandemic has given many children a greater sense of social isolation, making it difficult to engage with each other even while on campus.

"It can be challenging because they are in masks and they are separated. There have been more examples of fights breaking out on campus, students acting out, or kids who have experienced weight gain because they haven't participated in the activities they use to be involved with."

She said the pandemic has shown the importance of mental resilience whose lessons often include learning meditation, practicing yoga and encouraging gratitude.

Another program to combat social isolation dubbed "Start with Hello," was created by students and administrators in the aftermath of the Sandy Hook school shooting in Connecticut.

"We introduced it during the pandemic to try to create ways of connection for our students to decrease some of that social isolation by showing them how to be more inclusive and connected to one another. We gave them conversation starters to easily introduce themselves to somebody they don't know and to create nametags to help

introduce themselves to new peers."

Braun said at HealthCorps the mind, body and spirit do not work in isolation. They are all connected.

"We believe what you eat and how you exercise, as well as the practice of gratitude - all of that has to do with your health in its entirety. It's not just about just the body or the mind. They really work with one another."

The latest innovation to reach out to teens is "@TeenHealthVibe" where teens are encouraged to access HealthCorps resources that are being incorporated in schools. It's available on Instagram and will soon also be available on TikTok.

plan started June 7.

Some students opted for an ACT prep class that is being offered virtually.

Forty-two students signed up initially, but Feroli says not all have followed up by logging on.

The prep class is self-paced and will remain open to those students through June 30.

The class includes review segments in each of the ACT testing areas – English, math, reading, science and writing.

Each review segment is followed by the test for that topic.

Social studies teacher and coach David Sikes is available to assist the ACT prep students.

Feroli said some students take advantage of the option to retake some sessions.

She added that juniors take the ACT as their state test.

The second prong is voluntary participation working on math and reading skills.

That class consists of 18 high school students and 13 junior high schoolers.

It meets in the high school library and there are two teachers – Katie Clayton and Rachel Barnett – present, as well.

The class meets in person from 9 a.m. until noon Monday through Wednesday and Thursday is a virtual day.

Credit recovery is the third prong, allowing students to complete requirements and resolve an incomplete grade.

A dozen students are enrolled and that instruction is all in person.

The emphasis is on English taught by Feroli and math taught by Bryan Young.

Participation is voluntary,

but it isn't rocket science to figure out that 12 days in the summer is a better option than a full semester come fall, Feroli said.

In fact, some students are able to recover those credits in as little as one or two days.

The summer schedule also includes some special education offerings, as well as students for whom English is a second language.

With the exception of the ACT prep, the summer classes will run through June 24.

Feroli admits she was a little skeptical about the numbers, but now she's convinced the summer session has been "very positive" for all concerned.

"It's been a really good thing," she said, adding she anticipates the session is here to stay "in some capacity."

Called to preach

The Rev. Nate McConathy preached one guest sermon May 2 at Union Hill Baptist Church and that evening was offered the pulpit his father held for 21 years.

Neighbor:

"He didn't want anyone to think anything shady was going on," Nate explained, adding "I never dreamed I would be here."

Rather it was the Union Hill youth pastor who reached out to Nate.

When Nate sent him his resume, the youth pastor handed it to the search team.

Nate was invited to deliver a guest sermon on May 2. He chose as his topic "Characteristics of Christ," drawing from the 13th chapter of Luke.

The church's response was quick. Nate was offered the pulpit that night. And just as quickly, he accepted.

Nate is careful not to compare himself to his father, although "he was a great pastor and I want to be great as well."

He defines his calling in the simplest of terms.

"I have desire to help people to love Jesus (and) to love other people," he said. "The biggest thing we can do to love Jesus is be honest, open and vulnerable to other people ... so they can be themselves. People who make mistakes, but are forgiven by God.

"If there's one thing I've learned over 10 years, you have to start with love. When we love people the way God loves us – unconditionally – is when people's lives are changed by the Gospel."

As he settles into a new role in a new church, Nate isn't letting any grass grow under his feet.

On Saturday he and 16 parishioners will fly to Haiti on a week long mission trip during

which they will build a new church for Calvary Baptist in Canan.

Accompanying him will be Hunter Askew, Stephanie Branch, Jacie Carr, Amy Comforth, Aubrey Comforth, Emily Comforth, Tony Comforth, Andrew Dewbre, Jordan Ford, Matt Henderson, Kara McDonald, Brody Moore, Paul Moore, Acie Rod, Sunny Sanders and Josh Shade.

On July 11, the church will host Destination Dig, a vacation Bible school open to youngsters fifth grade and younger.

The VBS will meet at 6 p.m. through July 15.

And one month to the day after VBS ends, Union Hill will resume regular Sunday worship in the sanctuary.

That will include one hour of discipleship (Sunday School) and one hour of worship.

To that end, Nate is working on involving more people in the church by allowing them to serve different ministries.

Union Hill presently has three deacons and Nate is putting together a church leadership team.

"Church is necessary," he said. "The world needs a church; our culture needs a church."

Presently, Nate is preaching on "Be About It," which explores the virtues in Scripture "that the church – people – should be about in their lives."

"After that, we'll jump into the Book of John and measure our lives against Jesus. He has to be our ultimate measure."

Nate attended a non-denominational church for a year and has friends who are ministers in other denominations like Assembly of God and Christian.

But Southern Baptist "holds closest to what I believe," he said.

Although the denomination is poised on the brink of a battleground between ultra-conservative and ultra-liberal factions, Nate eyes the future as a middle-of-the-road moderate.

"We need to be people who understand the far reaches," he said, "but real lasting change always comes from common sense right in the middle."

Union Hill has about 220 who attend weekly services and is ranked the denomination's largest rural church – outside city limits – in Oklahoma.

To Nate, the church and politics are like oil and water. They don't mix.

Nate said he's judgemental and pessimistic by nature.

"Those are the things I pray for most about myself," he said. "I want people to see Jesus when they see me and I work constantly on seeing the good in people and good in the world." He makes it a personal pledge.

"We will always be a church as long as I'm here that sets aside trivial differences ... and always focuses on being like Jesus," he said.

"If anyone is looking for a church to belong to where they don't have to explain themselves or apologize for who they are or who they've been, this is the place for them!"

Fewer Drivers License Suspensions

Bill Number: House Bill 1795

Authors: Reps. Nicole Miller, R-Edmond, Daniel Pae, R-Lawton, John Talley, R-Stillwater, Eric Roberts, R-Oklahoma City; Sen. Kim David, R-Porter

This bill outlaws driver's license revocations for non-traffic-related offenses and allows people whose driving privileges have been revoked to attain a provisional license.

The state Department of Public Safety has the authority to suspend a person's driver's license if they fail to pay traffic or court fines or if they're convicted of certain offenses involving a motor vehicle. In 2015, Oklahoma Watch reported that former prisoners re-entering society must often pay thousands of

dollars in fees to have their driver's license reinstated.

Starting November 1, a person whose license has been suspended because of failure to pay a fine or fee can petition for a provisional license that would allow them to drive from 6:00 a.m. to 11:59 p.m. with certain exceptions.

The petitioner would be required to pay at least \$5 per month towards their court fines and fees to keep the provisional license. If their suspended license hasn't expired, they wouldn't be required to take another driver's test.

Miller, the bill's House author, said in a statement that the bill will make it easier for people coming out of the justice system to keep their job and pay off their outstanding court debt.

Carrying the ‘Big D’ Spirit in Us all

This past Saturday morning as we sat in the back of the auditorium preparing to honor our friend Big D, two tall young men walked in and sat down a couple of rows in front of me. Recognizing them, I joined them on the row, giving and getting hugs the way we always do.

We, along with several hundred others, had come to the Oaks Fellowship church in Red Oak to celebrate the life of our former player and teammate Darren Eubanks. To us, he was always just Big D.

The two young men who came to honor Big D were two of our talented Red Oak players from near the end of the 2010 decade. Trevor Conner was

one, and he had texted me a couple of weeks ago to let me know about Big D. With him was Big Earl Graves, the post man on our region semi-finalist team during that era.

Both young men hover right at 6’7”, as does Luke Eubank, who, on this day, was walking down the aisle with Big D’s large extended family. Luke had the heaviest heart, for Big D was his uncle, even though the two were the same age.

Most of you who read our columns will not know Big D nor the stories – the valuable morals, really – hidden within his life: Huge in Big D’s life was his work as a professional vocalist and musician. What a dream come true it must’ve been when he recently made it on “American Idol” with his former Red Oak High School friend in a group called D and Chi. Appropriately, “Chi” – Chima Ijeh – performed brilliantly on stage for his partner and friend that morning with their band.

Darren Eubank’s amazing life, cut short by that familiar culprit we all know, was amazing from the very beginning. The Lord had a plan for our friend from the start, of that we can be sure. Significant in his life is that he was a black gentlemen raised by a white family.


The Eubank family took him in as a foster child and kept him until agencies sought to place him with a new family, a family – as Big D’s dotting wife Brecia said at the ceremony – that matched his ethnicity.

While he was scheduled to leave the Eubank family and go to a new home, the transfer never transpired. The Eubank family sought to keep Big D and raise him, and they did. They raised one of the most humble, easy-spoken, cheerful young men I ever knew.

That storylines in this young man’s 29 years would rival the plot of a Steinbeck or Mark Twain novel. For me, it was powerful sitting in that auditorium, looking out over the hundreds who had come to honor a young hero of our age, and it was special sitting beside two of my ballplayers who fought side by side with us themselves in their key growing-up years.

It was special, in particular, noting that the greatest feeling in the air came not from what we could see but what we could not see. In that vast auditorium – stretching across four sections like a curtain – you could see no race, no color, no cultural differences. None of that was to

This Saturday, June 19, is known as Juneteenth, short for June Nineteenth. It is also called Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, Liberation Day, or Emancipation Day. It celebrates the freeing of those who had been enslaved in the United States.

Juneteenth has been a tradition in the U.S. for more than 150 years. Its roots are in Texas where federal troops took control of the state and ensured that all enslaved people be freed 2-1/2 years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation on Sept. 22, 1862.

Since Texas was the last state to free those who had been enslaved, Juneteenth marked the effective end of slavery in the United States and is considered the longest running African American holiday.

Father's Day is this Sunday, June 20, so invite your father to come with you to church that day. Sometimes "fathers" may be grandfathers, uncles, brothers, friends, or even mothers or

grandmothers. They don't have to be male or related by blood to be a parental caregiver. Fathers may only be part-time due to custody issues.

I always think of St. Joseph on Father's Day. He was chosen by God to be Jesus's stepfather, or foster father, to help Mary rear Jesus. He was descended from King David, as was Mary, and was born around 100 B.C.E. (B.C.).

Joseph is thought to have been a widower of around 80 years old, with children, when he was promised to Mary, who was somewhere between 12 and 15 years old. From the references in Matthew and Luke, we see that Joseph was an honorable, just, and kind man. He is supposed to have lived to be 111 years old, dying in Israel around 1 C.E. (A.D.) This implies he was already dead before Jesus was crucified.

Joseph and Mary both were devout Jews and fulfilled all laws of that religion. Loyalty to Judaism is demonstrated by raising a family, which is a sacred duty. The Torah tells parents to teach their children about Judaism and their duties as Jews. Most Jewish parents want to raise their children to be a mensch, meaning a kind, responsible, and honorable person.

A good Jewish father is obligated to do the following for his son: to circumcise him, to redeem him if he is a first born, to teach him Torah, to find him a wife and to teach him a trade.

Tradition has Joseph as being a carpenter, but the word in the original Greek is "tekton," having a root related to the words technology and technical. The Greek term evokes an artisan in wood, or even iron or stone. Additional study of the Talmud sometimes translates the word for carpenter as "naggar" with an implication of Joseph being wise and highly learned in the Torah. In any case, he taught Jesus a trade and taught him Torah, as required.

In the Roman Catholic church, St. Joseph's feast day is March 19, and he is honored throughout March. He is the patron saint of workers, of the sick, and of a happy death. Sometimes he is seen in pictures and statues holding a white lily, which represents integrity, virtue, obedience and purity. Pope Francis declared the year from December 8, 2020 through December 8, 2021 as the Year of Saint Joseph.

Our message to all humans is that we all qualify for the grace of God, with no condemnation. Judgment is not our job, only God's. God bless us all this week and help us be a blessing to others!

Lawmakers:

“House Bill 1795 protects public safety while also giving people who have left incarceration more opportunity to pursue employment and education, which is so important to rejoining society successfully,” Miller said. “I have been working on this legislation for several years and was very glad to see it pass the floor with wide support from my colleagues.”

Expanded GPS Monitoring Eligibility

Bill Number: Senate Bill 456
Sponsors: Sen. Bill Coleman, R-Ponca and Rep. Garry Mize, R-Guthrie

This bill makes more Oklahoma prisoners eligible for release through the Department of Corrections’ GPS electronic monitoring program. S.B. 456 cleared the House with a 77-20 vote and the Senate by a 43-1 vote.

Under current state law, prisoners must meet the following criteria to be released on GPS monitoring:

- Serving a sentence of five years or less for a nonviolent crime. Those serving longer terms of imprisonment must have no more than 24 months left to serve;
- Classified as a minimum security offender upon entering state custody;
- Has not been convicted of a violent crime, listed in Section 571, Title 57 of the Oklahoma State Statutes, within the past 10 years; and
- Have an approved home offer.

Starting November 1, many nonviolent offenders, regardless of their initial security classification or sentence, will be eligible for GPS monitoring if they have three years or less remaining on their sentence. Exceptions include:

- Those who have been convicted of a violent crime in the past 10 years’
- Prisoners with an active protection order or misconduct allegation;
- Those convicted of a crime against a child or vulnerable adult; and
- Prisoners who reject substance abuse treatment or who require specialized treatment that’s not offered in the community.

The State Board of Corrections requested S.B. 456 during a meeting last November. Corrections department records show there were 264 people on GPS monitoring on June 1, down 58 percent from a year ago.

Expanded Juvenile Criminal Record Expungement

Bill Number: House Bill 1799

Authors: Reps. Nicole Miller, R-Edmond, Cindy Munson, D-Oklahoma City, Jose Cruz, D-Oklahoma City, Mark Lawson, R-Sapulpa; Sen. Paul Rosino, R-Oklahoma City

This bill makes it easier for young adults with a juvenile criminal record to ask the court for expungement.

Starting November 1, the young adult, their parent, legal guardian or attorney may petition for expungement once they completed their sentence and reached 18 years old. They must have also paid all fines and fees, fulfilled any court-ordered obligations and kept a clean adult criminal record.

Under current state law, those with a juvenile criminal record must wait until they turn 21 to request expungement.

Rep. Jose Cruz, one of the bill’s House authors, said in a news release that this law will help remove barriers to employment and housing that people with juvenile criminal records face. While juvenile court records aren’t available on publicly accessible websites like OSCN, they can show up during a background check from a prospective landlord or employer.

“To a lot of Oklahomans doing their best to improve

their circumstance, this policy change could be the difference in failure and success,” Cruz said.

Lawmakers considered these five criminal justice bills but they weren’t signed into law:

Increased Penalties for Shoplifters

Bill Number: Senate Bill 334
Authors: Reps. Rande Worthen, R-Lawton and Josh West, R-Grove; Sen. Lonnie Paxton, R-Tuttle

This bill would have allowed prosecutors to seek felony charges against certain shoplifters who commit multiple thefts over several months.

Per state law, if a person commits two or more thefts over 90 days and the total value of stolen goods exceeds \$1,000, prosecutors can raise the charge from a misdemeanor to a felony. S.B. 334 would have increased the calculating period from 90 to 180 days.

The measure passed through the House and Senate but never moved on to the governor’s desk.

Norm Smaligo, president of the Oklahoma Retail Crime Association, said his group requested the legislation to deter serial shoplifters who started taking more valuable goods after State Question 780 was enacted. The ballot initiative raised the threshold for felony theft from \$500 to \$1,000.

While total annual larceny crimes in Oklahoma dropped 4.2 percent from 2016 to 2019, the number of shoplifting offenses increased 4.3 percent over the same four-year period, state data shows. The total value of stolen goods also increased from \$230 million in 2016 to \$256 million in 2019.

“If someone walks into my store every day and steals 10 \$1 widgets, that’s not going to affect my bottom line,” Smaligo said. “But if someone comes in every day and steals three DeWalt drills, that’s going to seriously put a pinch on me. That’s the problem with focusing on the number of generic larceny crimes, it’s anything stolen from anywhere.”

The ACLU of Oklahoma and Oklahomans for Criminal Justice Reform both opposed the legislation, arguing that it would roll back S.Q. 780 and drive up the state’s incarceration rate.

Steele with the Oklahomans for Criminal Justice Reform said there’s no evidence that there’s a shoplifting epidemic in Oklahoma and S.B. 334 would not have enhanced public safety in Oklahoma.

“Generally speaking, people engaged in these activities are stealing for survival, because they’re in extreme poverty or because they have an untreated mental health condition,” he said.

Ending Nonviolent Sentence Enhancements

Bill Number: Senate Bill 704
Sponsors: Sen. Dave Rader, R-Tulsa

This bill would have prohibited courts from imposing sentence enhancements on defendants who have never been convicted of a violent felony, defined as any offense listed in Section 571 of Title 57 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

While similar to State Question 805, SB 704 would not have amended the state constitution and would have ensured that all domestic violence, animal cruelty and sexual offenses remain eligible for enhancement.

The bill passed 7-4 through the Senate Public Safety Committee but stalled in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Oklahomans for Criminal Justice Reform advocated on behalf of the bill, arguing that it would reduce Oklahoma’s prison population and save the state \$137 million over 10 years.

“My sense is that the tough-

ment and district attorneys, and their political allies lined up against it,” Steele said. “I think it was also pretty close to the vote on State Question 805, although it did address every concern that was addressed in 805.”

Creating a Death Penalty Conviction Integrity Unit

Bill Number: House Bill 1551

Sponsors: Rep. Kevin McDugle, R-Broken Arrow and Sen. Shane Jett, R-Shawnee

This bill would have authorized the state Pardon and Parole Board to hire an independent investigator and attorney to investigate death penalty cases where the prisoner presented a plausible claim of evidence.

The investigator and attorney would have been authorized to conduct an independent investigation and present its findings to the Pardon and Parole Board, state Attorney General and district attorney that prosecuted the prisoner’s case. Attorney General Mike Hunter, who announced his resignation on May 26, wrote last June that the Pardon and Parole Board has the authority to recommend commutation for prisoners sentenced to death.

The bill cleared the House Criminal Justice and Corrections committee but failed to advance to a floor vote.

While legal, the death penalty in Oklahoma has been on hold since 2015 after several executions were carried out incorrectly. Hunter told a legislative committee last October that the death penalty could return sometime in 2021.

Allowing Correctional Facilities to Sell Tobacco Products

Bill Number: House Bill 1114
Sponsors: Rep. Rick West, R-Heavener and Sen. Mark Allen, R-Wilburton

This bill would have allowed the Oklahoma Department of Corrections to sell tobacco products to prisoners. The measure cleared a criminal justice and corrections committee but failed in the House by a 35-60 vote.

Most U.S. states and corrections departments have banned smoking in their facilities over the past decade. Tobacco smoking in Oklahoma prisons has been illegal since 2012.

While smoking causes heart disease, lung cancer and other ailments that are expensive to treat, some states have reversed their tobacco smoking bans in hopes of stopping the trade of contraband tobacco and indoor smoking. Mississippi’s corrections department announced last December that they would allow smoking in designated outdoor areas.

West, who authored a similar bill in 2018, told CNHI Oklahoma three years ago that the tobacco ban created a black market and gave more power to prison gangs.

The Oklahoma Department of Corrections did not request or endorse H.B. 1114.

Creating an Oklahoma Prisoner Reentry Pilot Program

Bill Number: House Bill 2729

Sponsors: Rep. Ajay Pittman, D-Oklahoma City and Sen. Carri Hicks, D-Oklahoma City

This bill would have directed the state Department of Corrections to establish a Prisoner Reentry Pilot Program for parolees in Oklahoma or Tulsa County.

State corrections employees would have provided specialized support to parolees enrolled in the program, including assistance in finding housing, transportation and substance abuse services.

The agency would have been authorized to use funds from the federal government or private nonprofit organizations to fund the program.

H.B. 2729 advanced through the House by a 78-14 vote but failed to move past the Senate Public Safety Committee.
